## Parish Council plan an orchard for the community

The Parish Council is planning to plant more apple trees around the village beacon, creating a community orchard. It will add to the apple tree planted last year. All residents will be able to enjoy the blossom and the fruit of the trees planted at The Beacon. Volunteers will pick fruit regularly and take it to the monthly 'Fridays' Club at the Memorial Hall. Local children will also have the opportunity to be

engaged in picking, cooking and taking home fruit. There will be publicity via Downton Facebook groups for families to pick your own. It is planned that there will be some recipe cards available. The Council has pointed out that: "Downton has some lovely trees in the community areas, but no orchard areas. The new apple trees will belong to the community."

The Council is also applying for funding to plant further trees around the parish. A few trees will join the walnut tree in the playpark at Charlton All Saints. & Hawthorn) will separate the play-park with the aim of encouraging a sense of peace and tranquillity. There are also plans to plant wild flowers next year in various locations around the village - the Green Network is working with the Parish Council on these plans. 

#### PARISH COUNCIL THREE YEAR PLAN

In August, the Council approved a new three Year Plan. The main aims of the plan are: improving the health and wellbeing of residents, working with local groups to enhance the local environment (including street scene, public green spaces, footpaths, climate, rivers, overall image of Downton, Charlton All Saints, and Standlynch, road safety), respecting and preserving heritage, and working with local groups to encourage commercial prosperity.

Amongst the short term plans - to be actioned in the next six months - are the tree planting projects, investigation of river sustainability, and a redesigned website. Over

the next 12 months, the council will work on several more initiatives, including identifying interest in running a "Men's Shed" to support a volunteer workforce and commissioning a sustainability audit of council owned assets. Over the three year period, various other projects will depend on available funding. The council would aim to refurbish the public toilets and push for increased surgery facilities.

Copies of the plan can be picked up from the Library and the Leisure Centre, or on the Council's website from mid September. The plan will be reviewed every six months so that it responds to changing needs and ideas.


#### KATE HOWARD TALKS ABOUT HOMEOPATHY




#### SKY AT NIGHT BY MICHAEL F. BARRATT FRAS

This autumn will see three "supermoons", when the moon is close to the earth and appears to be slightly larger than normal. September's full moon (the "Harvest Moon") will be on the 18th, when there will also be a partial lunar eclipse in the early hours (between 3.12 and 4.15). October's full moon (the "Hunter's Moon") on the 17th, will be the brightest of the autumn supermoons.

The autumn equinox on 22 September marks the start of longer nights - which means longer periods of dark sky observing, with the Milky Way at its most prominent in the evening sky. In October, if you stay up into the early hours of the morning, the winter constellations, such as Orion (the Hunter) and Taurus (the Bull) are starting to appear over the eastern horizon.

Planets to look out for this autumn are: Mars - moving from the constellation Taurus (the Bull) into Gemini (the Twins) in

September, passing close by the star cluster Messier 35 on the night of 8/9 - giving a good view with binoculars. It rises after 11pm.

Jupiter - found in Taurus, rising earlier than Mars at around 10:30 pm in September (earlier through October). On the night of 23 September, the Moon will be very close to this gas giant planet which will be far brighter than anything else in the evening sky other than the Moon.

Saturn - closest to the Earth and at its brightest and highest this year on 8 September, when it can be seen opposite the sun. It is visible for most of the night in the constellation of Aquarius (the Water Bearer). Because of the angle at which it appears, its rings seem to be disappearing - this will be the case until 2026.



#### LOCAL PRODUCE AT THE BULL

Mike Moody, landlord at The Bull, is working hard to source the items on his menu as locally as possible. Most of the meat is supplied by the Moody Cow Farm Shop, based at Gouldings Farm in Ringwood - this includes dairy products and beef. The farm also keeps sheep and pigs. Other meat comes from Salisbury market, including the Wiltshire ham on the menu. Mike says: "Our emphasis is on quality - we choose menu items to use the best quality produce available. Traceability is important." Free-range eggs come from Fluffet Farm in Wimborne and are used throughout the menu. The Bull makes its own sausages - and pies are also made in house. The ethos is all

about local suppliers and minimising waste. Although vegetables are more of a challenge to source locally and



consistently, Mike and new chef, Simon, are proud of their home-cooked roast potatoes. The Bull uses local suppliers for its fish, and is currently putting together a fishing package for visitors, in conjunction with Rockbourne Trout Fishery.

Food is served at The Bull seven days a week. If readers mention the InDownton newsletter they will be given a 10% discount during September.

#### DRONE PICTURES FOR NEW DOWNTON VISITOR WEBSITE

A new website is being developed, with the support of the Parish Council, to promote Downton as a visitor destination. It will use funds allocated to the village from the Wiltshire Council Towns Programme. The programme supports the economy of settlements and Downton is just large enough to qualify!

New drone photographs of the village have been commissioned from local drone operator, Steve Kynaston. His drone will be above the village early in September to capture images of the iconic parts of Downton from the air including The Borough, The Moot and the river.

Steve has the appropriate licence and conforms to the CAA code on the use of drones. The photographs will help to show what a great

#### NEW RIVER GROUP

Concerned residents are planning to set up a Downton River Group to bring together like-minded people to help protect the river as it flows through Downton. The aim is to work alongside other local organisations, to monitor and record issues affecting the village's watercourses, to help educate and encourage positive actions and to improve the river environment where possible.



Members of the community, along with a group of local farmers, are already engaged in citizen science water quality testing with Community Interest Company FLOW. Data that is collected is shared on FLOW's website and in their newsletters, but more volunteers are needed for a variety of tasks such as building up photographic records of the watercourses and impacts of pollution; monitoring and recording wildlife; organising and analysing data; invasive species management; gravel cleaning.

Look out for details of the group's launch where it is hoped to invite an expert speaker. The river is an important part of the village, and following on from the River Fest initiative, a banner has been produced which can be borrowed from the group to spread awareness about the history, ecology and wildlife associated with the river. #### DOWNTON SOCIETY NEWS

The Downton Society AGM will be held in the Memorial Hall on the evening of 17 October. 

#### THERE'S A NEW CARPET CLEANER IN TOWN!



#### DOWNTON'S HISTORY THROUGH OBJECTS

It's probably hardly surprising that the eight bells that ring out from St Laurence Church are old. In fact, the two lightest bells date from 1946 when the ring of six bells had two new bells added. The oldest bell is number 5, which dates from the 14th century, possibly around 1350, making it one of Downton's oldest functioning items. Little is known of it's origin, but it has the inscription "R.W." which indicates that it was made by a foundry in Winchester which made bells for churches in the area during the middle of the 14th century. When it was manufactured, St Laurence was under the bishopric of Winchester. It's listed in the Church Building Council Schedule of Bells for Preservation, effectively making it a "listed" bell. It's around 100 years older than the next oldest bell in the tower, the sanctus bell. This bell is separate from the ring of eight and is rung during services. It was made at the Salisbury foundry in about 1499.



Bell number 5 would have been heard in the village for nearly 800 years as a witness to events including the Black Death Plague, the English Civil War and the two world wars. One of many changes to the church during this time was in 1791. The tower was raised so that the Earl of Radnor could see it from Longford Castle. It was lowered to its former height in 1859 to avoid the danger of collapse.

It's over 120 years since there was last significant work carried out on the bells, and a recent survey has recommended various works to the frame and bells to restore them to continue to ring out across the village for many years to come. The works will involve a significant amount of money, and plans are being made to raise the funds needed.


